Please submit the completed Notice of Violation to the chair, secretary or clerk of the public body to which the notice is directed. The Notice of Violation may also be mailed to Town of Pomfret, 5218 Pomfret Road, North Pomfret, Vermont 05053, or emailed to the Town Clerk at clerk@pomfretvt.us.

Upon receipt of a completed Notice of Violation, the public body will respond publicly to the alleged violation within 10 calendar days by either (a) acknowledging the violation and stating an intent to cure the violation within 14 calendar days or (b) stating that the public body has determined that no violation has occurred and that no cure is necessary.

Failure of a public body to respond to a written Notice of Violation within 10 calendar days will be treated as a denial of the violation for purposes of enforcement of the Open Meeting Law.
